Foster Family Agencies (FFA) – What is an FFA?

- FFAs are private, non-profit organizations that are contracted service providers for San Diego County Child Welfare Services
- Agency is approved by Community Care Licensing (CA)
- Agency holds the license and approves each resource home under its license
- ▶ Children are placed directly with the agency, who then places the children in approved homes

FFA Resource Parents receive ongoing, specialized support from their FFA, including:

- Master's level social workers that provide support, resources, and care coordination for any needs related to the child's placement in your home.
- FFA social workers that have a small caseload to provide the attention and support you need.
- FFA social workers that conduct weekly home visits once a child is placed. Subsequent visits may be changed to every other week depending on the child's needs.
- Ongoing training and case support staff.

What children are served through FFAs?

FFAs accept placement of any child in foster care, but can provide additional support or extra services to children with specialized needs. Types of children may include:

- Children with challenging behaviors or mental health needs
- ▶ Children with developmental delays, special health care needs, or certain medical conditions
- Older youth with increased parenting needs and challenging behaviors
- Sibling sets
- Infants and toddlers
